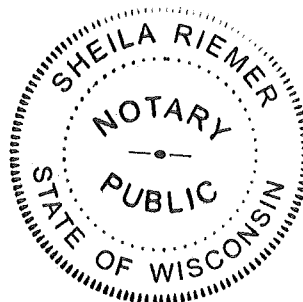

- (2) Off-lot parking spaces for residential uses shall be within two hundred fifty (250) feet of the principal entrance or the entrance for the individual occupants for whom the spaces are reserved while the farthest portions of a parking lot for all other uses shall be within three hundred (300) feet of the entrance of the establishment.
- (3) Accessory parking may be located in residential districts provided that said lots or property are immediately adjacent to a commercial, business or industrial zoning district.
- (4) All off-street parking lots adjoining lots zoned for residential use shall have a minimum setback of ten (10) feet from any interior lot line, except if the adjoining lot is used for legally conforming parking purposes.
- (j) **Surfacing.** All off-street parking areas shall be graded and surfaced so as to be dust-free and properly drained. Any parking area for more than five (5) vehicles shall have the aisles and spaces clearly marked.
- (k) **Restricted Areas.** No front yard of a lot in any Residential District and no front yard of a lot in any Business District upon which a dwelling unit is located shall be used for the parking of motor vehicles, nor shall motor vehicles parked on any other front yard be permitted within five (5) feet of the right-of-way line of a street.
- (l) **Curbs or Barriers.** Shall be installed so as to prevent parked vehicles from extending over any lot lines.

SEC. 13-1-93 DRIVEWAYS.

All driveways installed, altered, changed, replaced or extended after the effective date of this Chapter shall meet the requirements of Title 6, Chapter 3 of this Code of Ordinances:

SEC. 13-1-94 HIGHWAY ACCESS.

- (a) **Highway Access.** No direct private access shall be permitted to the existing or proposed rights-of-way of expressways, nor to any controlled access arterial street without permission of the highway agency that has access control jurisdiction. No direct public or private access shall be permitted to the existing or proposed rights-of-way of freeways, interstate highways and their interchanges or turning lanes nor to intersecting or interchanging streets within 1,500 feet of the most remote end of the taper of the turning lanes (such as exit and entrance ramps). No driveway openings shall be permitted within one hundred (100) feet of the intersection of an arterial street right-of-way line.
- (b) Access barriers, such as curbing, fencing, ditching, landscaping or other topographic barriers shall be erected to prevent unauthorized vehicular ingress or egress to the above specified streets or highways.
- (c) Temporary access to the above rights-of-way may be granted by the Zoning Administrator after review and recommendation by the highway agencies having jurisdiction. Such access permit shall be temporary, revocable and subject to any conditions required and shall be issued for a period not to exceed twelve (12) months.

Innovative DNR program to aid lead service line replacement

MADISON, Wis. - In a major effort to clear the way for cleaner water from the tap, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources plans to make \$11.8 million available to municipalities to help remove old lead service lines that bring drinking water into homes.

The move, coming in advance of National Drinking Water Week, May 1 -7, underscores DNR's commitment to safe drinking water and addresses the financial barriers facing many communities where lead service lines continue to deliver drinking water to residences. These service lines extend from the main street pipes owned by local utilities onto private property and into homes.

Lead service lines were gradually phased out of new construction during the 1940s and '50s but remain in some areas developed before that time. Lead service lines may deliver drinking water with elevated lead levels at the tap and even low levels of lead in blood have been shown to affect IQ, ability to pay attention and academic achievement.

"Clean, safe drinking water is fundamental to the health of our communities," said DNR Secretary Cathy Stepp. "Through this innovative effort, we are pleased to be able to support the efforts of private citizens and municipalities around the state to remove these old lead service lines."

To create the program, DNR is taking advantage of a recent decision by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency that allows greater flexibility in allocating federally funded loans for water infrastructure projects. Through the state's Safe Drinking Water Loan Program, DNR now has the ability to provide disadvantaged municipalities with funding to help cover the costs of lead service line replacements on private property.

Typically, homeowners are responsible for repair and replacement of service lines extending from the public right of way across their property and into the residence. Municipal water utilities bear responsibility for replacing the main lines.

Many homeowners are unable to afford complete replacement of lead service lines, which can range in price but averages about \$3,000 per home. Despite the cost, full replacement is recommended because a partial replacement can increase the amount of lead being released into the water.

"DNR recognizes the challenges many communities face in addressing the issue of lead service lines and the Safe Drinking Water Loan Program offers an effective way to fill the financial gap," Stepp said. "We're grateful to EPA for the flexibility that allows us to move forward. Following the required public comment period and approvals, we anticipate making these funds available for projects starting July 1, 2016."

Disadvantaged municipalities are determined based on factors including population and median household income. Under this proposal, municipalities with a population of less than 50,000 will be eligible for up to \$300,000 for lead service line replacement costs on private property. For medium-sized communities, that cap will be \$500,000, and for the largest municipalities - those with a population greater than 500,000 - the cap will be \$750,000.

Under the program, communities would determine how to distribute the funds to homeowners. If providing full funding for replacement at an average cost of \$3,000 per household, smaller municipalities could replace approximately 100 lead service lines, larger communities more than 166 lines and the largest municipalities more than 250 lead service lines. If the program proves successful, DNR would seek to provide a similar level of funding for the fiscal year starting July 1, 2017.

Municipalities will need to comply with the Safe Drinking Water Loan Program requirements and with federal regulations including Use of American Iron and Steel and Davis-Bacon wage requirements. Money for the lead service line replacement program does not represent new tax revenue; instead it represents new flexibility to allocate existing funds following a determination by U.S. EPA in March.

I know of several people that have owned these types of snakes. Our snakes are kept in cages at all times. My kids can hold if they choose but mom or dad are right there for them. My snakes have never bit anyone in the years of owning them. So I wish to try and remove the constrictors off the list being that you can buy them at a pet store. They are easy to buy just like a cat, dog, rat, ect.

Please take this into consideration on removing the constrictors from section 7-1-13(c)

- (b) **Accumulation of Fecal Matter Prohibited on Private Yards.** The owner or person in charge of the dog or cat must also prevent accumulation of animal waste on his/her own property by regularly patrolling and properly disposing of the fecal matter.

SEC. 7-1-11 INJURY TO PROPERTY BY ANIMALS.

It shall be unlawful for any person owning or possessing an animal, dog or cat to permit such animal, dog or cat to go upon any parkway or private lands or premises without the permission of the owner of such premises and break, bruise, tear up, crush or injure any lawn, flower bed, plant, shrub, tree or garden in any manner whatsoever, or to defecate thereon.

SEC. 7-1-12 BARKING DOGS OR CRYING CATS.

It shall be unlawful for any person knowingly to keep or harbor any dog which habitually barks, howls or yelps, or any cat which habitually cries or howls to the great discomfort of the peace and quiet of the neighborhood or in such manner as to materially disturb or annoy persons in the neighborhood who are of ordinary sensibilities. Such dogs and cats are hereby declared to be a public nuisance. A dog or cat is considered to be in violation of this Section when two (2) formal, written complaints are filed with the Village Police Department within a four (4) week period.

SEC. 7-1-13 PROHIBITED AND PROTECTED ANIMALS, FOWL, REPTILES AND INSECTS; FARM ANIMALS.

(a) **Protected Animals.**

- (1) Possession and Sale of Protected Animals. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to possess with intent to sell or offer for sale, or buy or attempt to buy, within the Village any of the following animals, alive or dead, or any part or product thereof: all wild cats of the family felidae, polar bear (*thalarctos maritimus*), red wolf (*canis niger*), vicuna (*vicugna vicugna*), gray or timber wolf (*canis lupus*), sea otter (*enhydra lutris*), Pacific ridley turtle (*lepidochelys olivacea*), Atlantic green turtle (*chelonina mydas*), Mexican ridley turtle (*lepidochelys kempi*).
- (2) Compliance with Federal Regulations. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to buy, sell or offer for sale a native or foreign species or subspecies of mammal, bird, amphibian or reptile, or the dead body or parts thereof, which appears on the endangered species list designated by the United States Secretary of the Interior and published in the Code of Federal Regulations pursuant to the Endangered Species Act of 1969 (Public Law 135, 91st Congress).
- (3) Regulating the Importation of Certain Birds. No person, firm or corporation shall import or cause to be imported into this Village any part of the plumage, skin or dead body of any species of hawk, owl or eagle. This paragraph shall not be construed to forbid or restrict the importation or use of the plumage, skin, body or any part thereof legally collected for use by the American Indians for ceremonial purposes or in the preservation of their tribal customs and heritage.

- (b) **Exceptions.** The provisions of Subsection (a) above shall not be deemed to prevent the lawful importation, possession, purchase or sale of any species by any public agency, institute of higher learning, persons holding federal permits, or by a person holding a Scientific Collectors Permit issued by the Secretary of the Department of Natural Resources of the state, or to any person or organization licensed to present a circus.
- (c) **Wild Animals; Prohibition on Keeping.** It shall be unlawful for any person to keep, maintain or have in his possession or under his control within the Village any poisonous reptile or any other dangerous or carnivorous wild animal, insect or reptile, any vicious or dangerous domesticated animal or any other animal or reptile of wild, vicious or dangerous propensities. Specifically, it shall be unlawful for any person to keep, maintain or have in his possession or under his control within the Village any of the following animals, reptiles or insects:
- (1) All poisonous animals and reptiles including rear-fang snakes.
 - (2) Apes: Chimpanzees (*Pan*); gibbons (*Hylobates*); gorillas (*Gorilla*); orangutans (*Pongo*); and siamangs (*Symphalangus*).
 - (3) Baboons (*Papio*, *Mandrillus*).
 - (4) Bears (*Ursidae*).
 - (5) Bison (*Bison*).
 - (6) Cheetahs (*Acinonyx jubatus*).
 - (7) Crocodilians (*Crocodylia*), thirty (30) inches in length or more.
 - (8) Constrictor snakes.
 - (9) Coyotes (*Canis latrans*).
 - (10) Deer (*Cervidae*); includes all members of the deer family; for example, whitetailed deer, elk, antelope and moose.
 - (11) Elephants (*Elephas* and *Loxodonta*).
 - (12) Ferret.
 - (13) Game cocks and other fighting birds.
 - (14) Hippopotami (*Hippopotamidae*).
 - (15) Hyenas (*Hyaenidae*).
 - (16) Jaguars (*Panthera onca*).
 - (17) Leopards (*Panthera pardus*).
 - (18) Lions (*Panthera leo*).
 - (19) Lynxes (*Lynx*).
 - (20) Monkeys, old world (*Cercopithecidae*).
 - (21) Ostriches (*Struthio*).
 - (22) Pumas (*Felis concolor*); also known as cougars, mountain lions and panthers.
 - (23) Rhinoceroses (*Rhinocero tidae*).
 - (24) Sharks (class *Chondrichthyes*).
 - (25) Snow leopards (*Panthera uncia*).
 - (26) Tigers (*Panthera tigris*).
 - (27) Wolves (*Canis lupus*).
 - (28) Poisonous insects.
- (d) **Exceptions; Pet Shops.** The prohibitions of Subsection (c) above shall not apply where the creatures are in the care, custody or control of: a veterinarian for treatment; agricultural fairs; shows or projects of the 4-H Clubs; a display for judging purposes; an itinerant or transient carnival, circus or other show; dog or cat shows or trials; public or private educational institutions; licensed pet shops; zoological gardens; if:

- (d) Each day that a violation of this Chapter continues shall be deemed a separate violation. Any dog found to be the subject of a violation of this Section shall be subject to immediate seizure, impoundment and removal from the Village by Village officials in the event the owner or keeper of the dog fails to remove the dog from the Village. In addition to the foregoing penalties, any person who violates this Chapter shall pay all expenses including shelter, food, handling and veterinary care necessitated by the enforcement of this Chapter.

SEC. 7-1-21 KEEPING OF BEES.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to establish or maintain any hive, stand or box where bees are kept or keep any bees in or upon any premises within the corporate limits of the Village unless the bees are kept in accordance with the following provisions:
 - (1) No hive, stand or box where bees are kept shall be located closer than twenty (20) feet to any property boundary. Such hives, stands or boxes may only be located in the rear yard.
 - (2) If bee colonies are kept within fifty (50) feet of any exterior boundary of the property on which the hive, stand or box is located, a barrier that will prevent bees from flying through it, no less than five (5) feet high, shall be installed and maintained along said exterior boundary. Said barrier may be either a natural planting or artificial.
 - (3) Fresh, clean watering facilities for bees shall be provided on the said premises.
 - (4) The bees and equipment shall be kept in accordance with the provisions of state law.
 - (5) A conditional user permit shall first be obtained pursuant to the Village Zoning Code.
- (b) Nothing in this Section shall be deemed or construed to prohibit the keeping of bees in a hive, stand or box located within a school or university building for the purpose of study or observation.

SEC. 7-1-22 PENALTIES.

- (a) Any person violating Sections 7-1-16, 7-1-17, 7-1-18, 7-1-19, 7-1-20 or 7-1-21 shall be subject to a forfeiture of not less than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) and not more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00). This Section shall also permit the Village Attorney to apply to the court of competent jurisdiction for a temporary or permanent injunction restraining any person from violating any aspect of this Ordinance.
- (b)
 - (1) Anyone who violates Sections 7-1-1, 7-1-2, 7-1-3, 7-1-4 and 7-1-5 of this Code of Ordinances or Chapter 174, Wis. Stats., shall be subject to a forfeiture of not less than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) and not more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for the first offense and not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and not more than Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) for any subsequent offenses.
 - (2) An owner who refuses to comply with an order issued under Section 7-1-5 to deliver an animal to an officer, isolation facility or veterinarian or who does not comply with the conditions of an order that an animal be quarantined shall be fined not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) nor more than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) or imprisoned not more than sixty (60) days or both.
- (c) Any person who violates Sections 7-1-6 through 7-1-15 of this Code of Ordinances shall be subject to a forfeiture of not less than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) and not more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for the first violation and not less than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) and not more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for subsequent violations.

Tom Prince Memorial Park – Siren pole cost was \$1,597.50 for a 60' pole installed. The cost of a 55' pole is \$800 - \$900. 55' would be sufficient for the ball field. Infield is 55' and the outfield is 60'. Dunn Energy provided the previous poles, but Trustee Klukas did not believe that was an option any longer. Other discussion: Can we allow the energy company to advertise if they provide poles? The installation of the poles could be done by the company that Don Knutson used for the siren pole. Trustee Klukas will do some additional checking with Xcel Energy to see if they would have any poles available for the Village to use for field lights.

Jeff Prince mentioned the other projects the Softball Association would like to consider for 2015:

- Roofs on the other two sets of bleachers.
- Dugout roofs need repair.

Evergreen Cemetery

- **Sign** – Should the sign state Colfax, WI because there is another Evergreen Cemetery in Menomonie, WI. Ron Jasperson said that the recorded name is Colfax Cemetery, but the sign says Evergreen Cemetery. Official name is Colfax Cemetery, but locals know it as Evergreen Cemetery. Suggestion was to change the sign to Colfax Evergreen Cemetery.
- **Road** – We have to saw cut the road. Rand Bates recalls Chris Olson estimated it would take 14 loads. Rand should get new estimates for crushed rock for the cemetery road completion.
- **Price for cremation burial plot** – A cremation plot is 3' x 3', but as you move towards the odd shape part the size changes to 2' x 2' vs. a regular burial plot which is 4' x 8'. The price of the 4' x 8' is \$400. Ron Jasperson suggested that the Village should establish the size of the vault or box that should be buried in the cremation burials. The prices for the cremation burial lots discussed were \$150 or \$200. Schieber will contact some local funeral home directors for pricing of plots locally so we can review all plot pricing. We are leaning towards allowing plates and no headstones.
- **Remembrance Garden** – Spreading garden will be located on the north side of the cemetery near the cremation plots. The garden is a 167' x 49' on one side and 36' on the other side. You cannot dump the urn of ashes, but you can spread ashes and there would be a bench to sit on. At some point get a fountain in the garden. We continue working on these topics.

Fairgrounds

- **Outlets – Beer Tent** – Trustee Schieber was not able to connect with Chris Fogarty. We will discuss at a later date.
- **Beer Garden – Water retention issue** – Committee discussed two options for the water retention. 1) Remove at least two concrete slabs to the west side of the dance floor, add a site drain and dig a trench for pipe to drain to the creek. The cost of the pipe is approx. \$750.00, the cost to excavate the trench for the pipe and site drain is \$900, total approx. \$1,650.00. There would be some additional cost for rip rap and hydro seed.

A motion was made by Trustee Klukas and seconded by Trustee Davis to recommend to the Village Board to move the cement slabs, put in the site drain and pipe water to the creek with cost not to exceed \$2,000. Voting For: Trustees Klukas, Davis and Schieber. Voting Against: none. Motion carried.

- **Parking area-Water retention issue-** There is a drain in the northeast side of the lawn; with a little grading, the water would run to the site drain. No action.
- **Garbage receptacle inserts-** A motion was made by Trustee Davis and seconded by Klukas to recommend to the Village Board to purchase seven green lids and the inserts for the garbage receptacles with a base cost of \$1,078.00. Voting For: Trustees Davis, Klukas and Schieber. Voting against: none. Motion carried.
- **Ice skating rink warming building-** A motion was made by Trustee Davis and seconded by Trustee Klukas to recommend to the Village Board to approve siding on the warming building not to exceed \$300.00. Voting For: Trustee Klukas, Davis and Schieber. Voting against: none. Motion carried.
- **Lawn Mower-** A motion was made by Trustee Klukas and seconded by Trustee Davis to approve Rand Bates to get pricing on a new mower with a trade-in of our current mower. Parks has an equipment budget amount of \$16,900.00. Voting For: Trustees Schieber, Klukas and Davis. Voting against: none. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Trustee Klukas and seconded by Trustee Davis to adjourn the parks committee meeting at 6:55 p.m. All members voted yes. Meeting adjourned.

Tower Park Update

- Thursday, May 12th, 2016 – trench was dug for the piping; 32" of concrete was poured around the piping and recovered. The concrete was removed from the handicap ramp and sidewalk on the south side of the building and on the south east corner of the building in front of the storm water drain. Friday morning it rained and I contacted Mr. Eaton to get an update regarding the fencing and the sidewalk accessibility, employee entrance and other safety concerns for the weekend. After our discussion Mr. Eaton sent a crew to add additional safety precautions since the sidewalk would not be available over the weekend and the curb side of the construction had a safety concern.
 - Monday, May 16th, 2016 – There was a full crew here for a long day. The work site was re-opened and prepped for concrete. Mr. Eaton informed Village Hall and Logslett of the following schedule:
 - Tuesday - Sidewalk and slabs up to the handicap ramp on south side of the building will be poured and no traffic will be allowed for three days.
 - Wednesday - The concrete on the west side of the building will be poured and no parking for ten days.
 - June 3rd, 2016 -Senn will be pouring asphalt on the parking lot.
- **Tom Prince Memorial Park**-The lights at the Tom Prince Memorial Park – still waiting on the new ballasts. Hopefully next week we can get this project started and finished.
- **Ordinances** – There have been a lot of ordinance questions. Can definitely tell that it is spring.
- **Surveys** – The information is being gathered in hopes to have the information next week.
