Burcham and Stene. Others Present: Eric Turner-Dunn County Economic Development, Jordan Pospishil – West Central Regional Planning Commission, Revolving Fund Loan Program, Tom Niska – Timber Technologies, LLC, Jon Strand – CBS Squared, Mark Mosey, Public Works Director Bates, Administrator-Clerk-Treasurer Niggemann and LeAnn Ralph with the Messenger.

Pledge of Allegiance

Public Comments

Eric Turner – Turner wanted to thank the Village for their support and for allowing the Village President to serve on the Dunn County Economic Development Board. The DCED also wants to share a new program that is being piloted by the City of Menomonie. The program is designed to help get the local working people to also reside in the within our communities. The program works with employers and municipalities to loan money up to \$10,000 to assist in the purchase of homes within the community. The payback would be very low and allows for some loan forgiveness if there are improvements to the home by the end of the loan term. The other movement is the Broad Band initiatives. The DCEC was awarded the Telecommuted Forward award. In August the DCEC would like to take a tour of communities outside of Menomonie.

Jordan Pospishil- Pospishil wants to make awareness of the Economic Development financing availability. The Façade Program is designed to help business with the exterior of their buildings, zero percent interest for loan amounts from \$5,000 to \$30,000 with a 15 year payback. It is not designed to help with routine maintenance, but to help the downtown look nice. Some of the other loans include the revolving loan funds programs which assists with 25% of the funding to get a business off the ground, the micro loan program, designed to help with business start-up - up to \$30,000 and the growth loan for businesses after start up to assist with needed funding up to \$60,000. None of the loans are designed to compete with the banks, but to assist with projects that may need additional funding or cannot get traditional funding.

Communications from the Village President- Stene wanted to make awareness that the Broadband survey results indicated that good internet is criteria that heavily influences whether a business or homeowner decides to locate in a particular area. One other thing is that the snow is getting out of hand, so what are we going to do with it? There is a lot of continuation and worry regarding the snow. So we wanted to find out what the Village's legal obligation was and basically what we found out is that the snow if the homeowners responsibility to get rid of. In the spring, the water will become an issue. Unfortunately, this is an unusual year. There will be an article in the paper from the Village President thanking the homeowners for their patience throughout the weather and also thanking the Public Works employees for their hard work.

Consideration Items

Community Health Needs – KT Gallagher – KT Gallagher provided a 2019 Dunn County Health Needs Assessment survey. I have added the survey to our website. There is a due date of April 1, 2019. Gallagher was not able to attend and may be added to the next agenda to express the importance of the survey and how it came to be.

Timber Technologies LLC – Variance Request – A motion was made by Trustee Wolff and seconded by M. Burcham to approve the request for the two driveways with the widths of 36 feet and 37 feet. Voting For: Trustees Halpin, Davis, Wolff, Jenson, M. Burcham, K. Burcham and Stene. Voting Against: none. Motion carried.

Colfax Railroad Museum Letter of Support – A motion was made by Trustee Halpin and seconded by Trustee Wolff to approve the Letter of Support for the Colfax Railroad Museum. Voting For: Trustees Jenson, M. Burcham, K. Burcham, Stene, Halpin, Davis and Wolff. Voting Against: none. Motion carried.

Dunn County Emergency Management request – discussion and possible action – Dunn County Emergency Management asked the Village to discuss how and if they will play any part of snow removal during this particular snowfall year in regards to potential spring flooding. Discussion items: Is there a location that snow can be moved to from their lots? Snow removal by property owners can be disposed of by contacting Public Works department.

The other issue is whether sand bags would be provided to prevent water from potentially going into basements. Pricing for the sand bags is \$0.17 per sand bag; you could get 588 bags for approximately \$100. The Village would not provide any man power to fill bags, etc. It was recommended that in the event of a Village-wide need, the Village would purchase sand bags at that time.

WWTP Bank Stabilization CDBG Project discussion and possible action- Strand explains that the WWTP Bank Stabilization project has become eligible for some CDBG project funding and the US Army Core of Engineers has authorized the CDBG funds as match funds. The CDBG grant allows to request up to 1 million dollars of funds with \$500,000 of match funds. Costs of approximately \$33,000 for engineering would not qualify for funding under either program. These funds will be a cost to the Village.

WWTP Bank Stabilization CDBG Committee – The Village President Stene is appointing the Village Board and one Village resident to comprise the committee. A motion was made by Trustee Halpin and seconded by Trustee Davis to approve the WWTP Bank Stabilization CDBG Citizen Participation Plan to include the Village Board and Mark Mosey as the Village resident and at least one member of the

committee meets the low to moderate income requirements. Voting For: Trustees K. Burcham, M. Burcham, Jenson, Wolff, Davis, Halpin and Stene. Voting Against: none. Motion carried.

WWTP Bank Stabilization CDBG Citizen Participation Plan – Resolution 2019-02 CDBG Citizen Participation Plan – The CDBG Citizen Participation Plan is a requirement of the grant which formally states that the Village will allow citizen participation throughout the project.

A motion was made by Trustee Jenson and seconded by Trustee M. Burcham to approve Resolution 2019-02 CDBG Citizen Participation Plan with appropriate changes to include the Village resident as discussed previously. Voting For: Trustees Wolff, Davis, Halpin, Stene, K. Burcham, M. Burcham and Jenson. Voting Against: none. Motion carried.

Set Public Hearing Date – April 8th, 2018 at 6:30 p.m., Village Hall – A motion was made by Trustee M. Burcham and seconded by Wolff to set the public hearing date of April 8th, 2019 at 6:30 pm. Officer Kurt Devroy is very interested in attending training to become a Drug Recognition Expert. He has done a lot of research and has been keeping me filled in on his progress. Not every Officer that applies is accepted to attend this training. However, Officer Devroy with his pursued diligence, was accepted to attend this training.

There are only a handful of "DRE's" in the surrounding counties, and not always available. With what appears to be a consistent and climbing drug environment, I believe having someone trained in this area would be invaluable. Not only do "DRE's" detect impaired driving, they would be able to field test people involved in other types of cases as well where the presence of drugs may be considered an important issue, including child neglect, weapons offenses, and sexual assault investigations.

I have attached information in regards to this training. The training is a total of 16 days, broken up throughout the months of April and May. Officer Devroy would be absent from work for approximately 16 days total. I know you are aware that our department is running short handed right now, but part time Officer Bautch was able to pick up several of the shifts, and I will work some extra hours to help gaps in coverage.

This training is fully paid for, including tuition, lodging, 2 meals per day, and will be of very little cost to the police department budget.

I am out of town for the scheduled board meeting, but Officer Devroy is working that evening and could answer any questions you may have.

Drug Recognition Expert

A **Drug Recognition Expert** (DRE) is a law enforcement officer trained to identify people whose driving is impaired by <u>drugs</u> other than, or in addition to, alcohol. All DREs follow the same 12 step procedure called a Drug Influence Evaluation (DIE), to determine which category of drugs is causing the driver to be impaired.^[1]

If a DRE determines that a driver was too impaired to operate a vehicle in a safe manner, they will look for indications of the drug(s) suspected, by the common perceivable effects the drugs have on the human body.^[2] There are seven categories of classifications a DRE is looking for, including; central nervous system depressants (benzodiazepines), CNS stimulants (methamphetamine), dissociative anesthetics (PCP), cannabis, hallucinogens (mushrooms), inhalants (glue), and narcotic analgesics (opiates).^[2]

DREs often testify in court, where the term "expert" has important legal implications. Some jurisdictions do not allow the term Drug Recognition *Expert*. In these jurisdictions DREs are called Drug Recognition Evaluators, or Drug Recognition Technicians.

The acronym 'DRE' has been used to refer not just to the DRE officers, but also to the examination they perform, the "Drug Recognition Examination", or "Drug Recognition Evaluation." The confluence of acronyms leads to confusion, and the IACP now calls the evaluation done by DRE officers the "Drug Influence Evaluation", DIE.

DIEs were developed by police officers from the Los Angeles Police Department in the early 1970s. The officers' drug recognition methods were officially recognized by the LAPD management in 1979, and adopted by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration in the early 1980s.

As of 2005, approximately 6,000 police officers are certified as Drug Recognition Experts. Certification is issued by the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP). To remain certified and in good standing, DREs must track their evaluations and enter the results into an online database.

The credibility of methods used by DREs has been questioned as unreliable and subjective. DRE testimony is not accepted in all jurisdictions.^[4]

DRE training

DRE training and certification standards are defined by the International Association of Chiefs of Police ^[5] Training is available only to "a person ... in the employ and under the direct control of ^[2] a public criminal justice agency involved in the enforcement of criminal or traffic safety laws^[1] or an institution involved in providing training services to officers of law enforcement agencies.".^[6] IACP standards require DREs training to be done using an official Student Manual. This manual.^[7] is widely cited in court as defining standards for the performance of a Drug Influence Evaluation.

12-Step DRE process

A DIE involves the following 12 steps (a detailed description for each step is given at the DECP.org[8])

- 1. Breath Alcohol Test: The arresting officer reviews the subject's breath alcohol concentration (BrAC) test results and determines if the subject's apparent impairment is consistent with the subject's BrAC. If so, the officer will not normally call a DRE. If the impairment is not explained by the BrAC, the officer requests a DRE evaluation.
- 2. Interview of the Arresting Officer
- 3. Preliminary Examination and First Pulse
- 4. Eye Examinations
- 5. Divided Attention Psychophysical Tests
- 6. Vital Signs and Second Pulse
- 7. Dark Room Examinations
- 8. Examination for Muscle Tone
- 9. Check for Injection Sites and Third Pulse
- 10. Subject's Statements and Other Observations
- 11. Analysis and Opinions of the Evaluator
- 12. Toxicological Examination : After completing the evaluation, the DRE normally requests a urine, blood and/or saliva sample from the subject for a toxicology lab analysis.

Scientific validation

The DIE testing done by DRE officers is said to be scientific. This claim is critical to the admission of DRE expert testimony in criminal trials. The DRE Student Manual identifies three scientific studies as being those that validate DRE testing. These studies are: Bigelow 1985 (aka the Johns Hopkins study); Compton 1986 (aka the LAPD-173 study); and Adler 1994 (aka the Arizona DRE Validation Study). Other studies have called into question the scientific validity of DRE methods. Some courts have held that DRE evidence is not admissible under the rules of evidence. In USA, the presiding judge can decide on a case-by-case basis (as of 2017).

Admissibility

In 2017, the Supreme Court of Canada held that the DRE is an "expert for purposes of administering the 12-step evaluation and determining whether [a defendant] was driving while impaired for the purpose of requiring further testing (emphasis added).... The DRE's expertise is not in the scientific foundation of the test but in the administration of the test itself." [15]

DRE Candidates,

Congratulations! You have been selected to attend the 2019 Spring DHS sponsored DRE School. The DRE School consists of two sections; Classroom Training and Field Certification Training. Attendance of all training is mandatory for certification.

I have attached an Emergency Contact Information sheet for you to complete. I will need to have this completed and sent back to me by email before Friday, March 8th.

The Classroom Training portion of the school will be held at the Milwaukee County Sheriff's Office Training Academy located at 9225 S. 68th St. Franklin, WI on April 9-12, 2019 and then again April 15-19, 2019.

The Field Certification Training will be held at the Milwaukee Police Department's Training Academy, located at 6680 N. Teutonia Av. Milwaukee, WI on the following dates: May 8-12, 2019 (nightshift hours) and then again, May 20-24, 2019 (dayshift hours, with some working in a local clinic each day). Note: The Final Knowledge Exam will be given on May 22, 2019.

The classroom hours at the Milwaukee County Sheriff's Office Training Academy are typically 8am to 4pm. The Field Certification hours are typically 7pm to 3am the first week, then 7am/9am to 3pm/5pm during the second week. One day of the second week will be spent in a local clinic and the start time will be 7am as opposed to the other days in the week that will start at 9am. I will send the specific hotel/lodging information and locations as well as rooming assignments and additional details in a follow-up email. You <u>DO NOT</u> have to make hotel reservations I will take care of that.

I have all the confidence in your success and truly believe you will make great DREs. Your Chief/Sheriff supports your efforts as do I, and I anticipate welcoming you to our DRE family by the end of the training course. You will find that your fellow DREs are an elite group of Law Enforcement Officers who are bonded together in their training achievements, strive for excellence in what they do, and work towards a common goal in removing the drugged/impaired drivers from our roadways.

The training will not be easy. They don't call us specialist, technician, or simply practitioner; they call us "Experts" for a reason! The training will call for study and practice beyond the typical 8a to 4p schedule. I highly doubt you will be compensated for those additional hours, most candidates rarely are, however, if you ask any DRE if it was worth it in the end, you will find most will agree it was the best training, and the most rewarding and useful experience they have ever received in Law Enforcement. I will end my motivational speech here, as I am sure you will get another at the start of class!

Attached is a proficiency exam checklist. You will need to demonstrate proficiency in the SFST's before the end of the Pre-School in order to continue in the program. The instructors will conduct the proficiency examinations in the morning on the first day of class, which is April 9. You will have until the end of the day on April 10 to demonstrate proficiency or you will not be allowed to continue on to the 7-Day DRE School, so please brush up on your skills and ensure that you are in compliance with the NHTSA standards that are on the checklist. In addition, I attached the administrative procedures for the three test battery, which are in compliance with the NHTSA standards. You can use them to help brush up on your skills.

Before I forget, you will need to bring a PBT during the Field Certification portion of the training and a laptop computer to do much of your work. You are not required to bring a laptop during the classroom portion of the training, but some find it useful for taking notes and such. The laptop won't need any special programs; we'll just be using "Word" documents and pdf files. I hope this will not be an issue. If this is going to be a problem please let me know as soon as possible. I don't have a remedy in mind but would start working on a solution if that were the case. I hope not.

The hotel we will be utilizing provides all breakfasts, and offers a dinner buffet Tuesday - Thursday nights as part of the cost of the room charge. Candidates are encouraged to take advantage of the meals

provided by the hotel, as there will not be meal reimbursements provided for this training as most meals are provided by the hotel. There are full kitchens with amenities provided in each suite to cook meals, and a grocery store a block away for those that prefer to cook for their selves. There are also BBQ grills available at no charge. If your agency wants to provide you with meal expense allotments please make those arrangements with your administrators.

During the classroom portion of the training at the Milwaukee County Sheriff's Office Training Academy you will be expected to dress in business casual attire. No jeans, cut-offs, or T-shirts are allowed during class. 5.11 pants, khaki pants, polo's, button-up shirts are fine. Ties are <u>not</u> necessary (just look decent and still be comfortable).

You will be expected to be in full uniform for all Field Certifications portions of the training with the exception of Wednesday May 22, 2019 during the Final Knowledge Exam, and the one-day you will be assigned to work in the clinic. This will include full duty belt, gun, and ballistic vest, unless told otherwise prior to the start of the training. While in the clinic you will be wearing business casual.

Grant funded local MPD officers if and when utilized will be the authority during this portion of the training and we will follow all directives and standards they set as we are their guests. We will be working in a training capacity and function with that being our primary objective, not law enforcement or making arrests!

If there is any one thing you can do to help prepare yourself for this training it is to memorize this document; I guarantee that completing this <u>one</u> task will make your life during training that much easier. You will be given a blank matrix at some point early in the training and will be expected to fill in all the blocks from memory; so make things easier and get it down now. You don't have to understand how it all comes together, there will be plenty of time for that, but if you get this <u>one</u> step out of the way you can focus on all the other information being presented and it will come together much more smoothly. Trust me on that!

DRE SCHOOL - ADDITIONAL DETAILS

COVERED COSTS

DHS will cover the costs associated with registration, lodging, and equipment issued. Issued equipment includes a DRE kit bag, stethoscope, sphygmomanometer, digital thermometer & probe covers, penlight, pupilometer, magnifiers and batteries. Issued classroom materials include student manuals & D-ring binders, 16GB flash drive, clipboard, ink pen, college ruled notebook and correction tape. I will send the specific hotel/lodging information and locations as well as rooming assignments with additional details in a follow-up email after the candidate selections have been made. They <u>DO NOT</u> have to make hotel reservations. I will take care of that later. The hotel we use is the Staybridge Suites in Franklin, Wisconsin, and is very close to the training facility. Each room is a large suite with two (2) candidates sharing a room. There are full kitchens in each suite and a grocery store a block away from the hotel. There are also BBQ grills available at no charge. The hotel provides breakfast daily and an evening food bar three days a week (Tuesday-Thursday). Candidates are encouraged to take advantage of the meals provided by the hotel, as there will not be meal reimbursements provided for this training as most meals are provided by the hotel. All other meals will be the responsibility of the officer and/or agency.

AGENCY COSTS

Agencies will be responsible for providing/issuing an acceptable Preliminary Breath Tester (PBT) for use by the DRE student during the Field Certification Phase of the training. Each officer will need a laptop computer (capable of processing "Word" documents and "pdf" files) to complete evaluations and narratives during the Field Certification Phase of the training. They are not required to bring a laptop during the classroom portion of the training, but some find it useful for taking notes and such. Transportation to and from the training is the responsibility of the individual officer and/or agency. Half of the officers attending will need to provide a squad car for use during the Field Certification Portion of the training. Unmarked squads are preferred, but it must have adequate emergency lighting to conduct a traffic stop if necessary. Grant funded local Milwaukee Police Department officers will be riding along in the squad cars and will be the authority during this portion of the training. We will be working in a training capacity and function with that being our primary objective, not law enforcement or making arrests! There may be additional costs that an agency might incur, but those costs would depend on each agency's individual policy, such as meals, mileage, drive time etc. DHS contracts with local and regional coalition groups who may be able to help pay for some of these costs, especially for smaller agencies who have to pay overtime to back fill the officer's position while they are at training. Those arrangements should be made directly with the local or regional DHS coalition group in your area.

DRESS CODE

During the classroom portion of the training they will be expected to dress in business casual attire. No jeans, cut-offs, or T-shirts are allowed during class. 5.11 pants, khaki pants, polo's, button-up shirts are fine. Ties are <u>not</u> necessary (just look decent and still be comfortable). They will be expected to be in full uniform for all Field Certifications portions of the training. This will include full duty belt, gun, and ballistic vest, unless told otherwise prior to the start of the training.
